## SOMALIA

---

Thankfully, there have not been an alarming number of cases of Covid in Somalia, which has allowed the team at Elman Peace to continue operations as normal.

We have continued our support with both the Safe House and Baby Home in Mogadishu. The baby home offers safety for rescued and abandoned babies and support for women and girls with unwanted pregnancies. The Safe House aims to improve the lives of survivors of sexual assault and gender based violence through support services and ultimately acts as a one stop service center for all of their immediate needs.

In partnership with the Aurora Humanitarian Initiative and Elman Peace, we are underway with the construction of the Girl's Leadership Academy in South Central Somalia which provides young girls with non-formal education, life-skills, leadership training and entrepreneurship training. The focus is on a rights-based curriculum in a country where many women and girls are disadvantaged.

Additionally, we're excited to have begun construction on the primary/elementary school that will be located on the Elman Peace compound.

The Taliban seized control of Afghanistan on August 15 which has brought a new surge of the pandemic as families are currently moving to refugee camps and agencies across the world. But despite the alarming events in the country, we are thrilled to report that last month the Love Does school reopened! The kids are once again learning how to read, do math, and are finding a path forward amidst the recent turmoil. Education is vital to creating a better future for our students and building stability in their daily lives. We are proud that we can also continue to support our teachers on the ground ensuring the continuation of their lessons.

To further our efforts, we have plans in place to open an office in Uzbekistan to better our school and potentially assist Afghan refugees settling in that country.

Our staff and friends in Afghanistan have faced immeasurable hardships this past quarter but have shown resilience in the face of adversity. We will continue to support them as they navigate a new political climate.


# NEPAL

In September, Nepal's government announced the ending of the lockdown that was in place beginning in April 2021, and covid numbers continue to decrease. The Brick Factory was previously shut down due to covid, but now that it has reopened to workers, plans have been made to reopen our neighboring school. The families that work in the Brick Factory were recently contacted to include their kids in the upcoming school year. The school provides not only meals and supplies for the kids, but a safe place for learning and playing. We are looking forward to having the kids back!

In the Love Does Girls Home, we just welcomed 4 new primary aged girls. We've been getting them ready for school with new laptops, clothes and supplies. Your support means these girls' needs are taken care of each day allowing them to dream big for the future!

# CONGO

---

The staff and teachers at our Love Does School in Congo saw a major spike in covid cases in their community this past quarter shortly after an active volcano erupted near Goma.

The lava destroyed the recently built primary school and nursery that we built with our friends at Justice Rising and Lauren Daigle's foundation, The Price Fund. Thanks to the Justice Rising team, hazard pay was distributed to over 100 teachers and staff members. In addition, they opened one of their other school locations to host an additional 1,500 students who needed a place to go.

We quickly rallied to raise money to rebuild the school and nursery, and we're happy to report that the team is able to rebuild on the part of our land that isn't covered by the lava's destruction. Plans are underway to start building the new structure soon and are looking forward to welcoming students back into the safe space the school provides.

We have officially broken ground on a second school in the Congo and look forward to reaching out to students in the surrounding areas to officially open the new school next Fall. Construction will continue over the upcoming months.

# USA - MOBILE FOOD PANTRY

During the pandemic, we bought a food truck! We've partnered with Urban Life to help identify families with food insecurity and have been delivering food to them weekly.

We've also partnered with Monarch school in downtown San Diego and are looking forward to bringing the Love Does mobile food truck to their campus to serve 50 families after school twice weekly. The Monarch School has been serving San Diego for over three decades, beginning as a one-room education center and expanding into a K-12 comprehensive school designed to educate homeless youth.

In addition, we've reached out to local resettlement agencies to deliver food to newly settled Afghan refugees who will be coming to California soon.

We're so excited to serve our neighbors here in San Diego!

## USA - PRISON PROGRAMS

---

For the last couple of years, we've been leading teams monthly into San Quentin to work with a special group of inmates. San Quentin is the oldest prison in California and the state's only death row, though governors have imposed a moratorium on executions since 2006. There are about 3,000 inmates currently at the prison.

We had to take a year hiatus due to covid especially as the inmates were particularly hit hard by the virus, but we've now resumed our ability to visit. We've started our Fall Dream Big class where we currently have 30 attendees. We look forward to the several special guests that are lined up to encourage our friends at San Quentin.

In addition, as part of our prison programs we've begun investing in a transitional home in Washington D.C. to further help and support inmates as they transition to a new season of life.
